## **1983 Pre-Season Story**

### **Can Lions repeat last year's success?**

So close...but yet so far.

The Wellsville Lions had battled all season, sometimes winning in a breeze and other times struggling, but they reached the pinnacle of high school baseball success: the Section Five championship game at Silver Stadium.

And as if it were a metaphor for the entire season, the Lions, trailing early in the game, battied back to tie the game before two back-to-back errors in the last inning scored the winning runs as Wellsville lost the momentum, the game...and the championship, 5-3, to Sodus.

Nine months later, the Lions are at it again. Except this is a different bunch than the talentladen, veteran Lion squad that combined strong pitching with timely hitting to reach the finals. The Lions taking the diamond now are younger: in the words of Coach Denny Miles, "There's a lot of talent out there, but it's not proven talent."

And as the 1983 edition of the Lions prepares to depart for its second annual "spring training" trip to Virginia, courtesy of the Wellsville Baseball Boosters Club, that may be the biggest obstacle for this new club to overcome.

For the first time in quite a while under Miles' five-year reign as coach, there will be some scrutiny of the pitching; no Glenn Law. Rick Boyd, Al Davidson, or last year's keity-righty shotgun duo of Randy Wright and Al Winans will be on the mound this year. "This, right now, is our biggest concern — the pitching." admits Miles. "This is the first year in five years that you can't look at the squad and definitely say. "This kid is No.1' before you get into the games."

It is no small feat to fill in the shoes of Winans and Wright. The two pitchers provided the heart and soul of last year's drive to the sectional crown, setting several team records along the way: fewest hits allowed (85), fewest earned runs allowed (23), fewest runs allowed (46 – tied with 1978 team), and lowest team ERA (1.13) as the Lions finished 17-4.

And then there is the question of hitting. Last year's squad, while not threatening the teamrecord mark of .332 set by the 1978 Lions, did feature seven all-stars, including Winans and Wright. Leading hitters Bob Insley and Chuck Costello, who hit .420 and .413, respectively, graduated and took their bats with them.

This year's Lions, says Miles, will run a lot to compensate for what may be a shortage of hitting. "Looking at last year and evaluating the team, a lot of the players have been around of minimum of two years, and four had around three years. A lot of the time they coasted, they relied on their talent to win, and they did win. They didn't get up for every game, like they were holding back for the sectionals," Miles says. Not so with the new Lions.

"This year's team has to come practice hard every day...it's like their personality is hard work and dedication. They practice a lot harder than last year's team," notes Miles, whose teams have won 89 games, lost 42 for a .679 percentage.

This year's team is composed of players who have, according to their coach, "a drive now where they want to be the best, whether it's Steuben County or the Mayor's Conference they want to win either one of those leagues, and let sectionals take care of themself. They've been on top the last few years, and they don't want to lose that."

As always, the Lions are in the unique postion of competing in two leagues: the Steuben County, the tougher of the two, features Canisteo (last year's Class B champ at 20-1 that whipped the Lions twice last year). Addison and Bath; the Mayor's Conference, in which the Lions went 6-0 last season, boasts of Olean, Allegany, Archbishop Walsh and a new member, Portville.

A look at the Lions, by position: **PITCHERS:** Miles is looking at a seven-man pitching staff and a lot of uncertainties. Whereas last year's staff was two-men deep, this year Miles figures to use four or five pitchers.

The frontrunner appears to be southpaw Craig Kalamets, who as a 15 year-old sophomore was clocked by Pittsburg Pirate officials with an 86 m.p.h. fastball. "He throws the ball extremely hard. The raw ability is there," says Miles.

Backing him up is Chris McNinch, a transfer student from Belmont. "So far he looks promising, never having seen him in live action," Miles notes. "He's got a sneaky fastball and a very good curveball. He's in the mold of Al Winans."

The rest of the pitchers — Dave Smith, Jim Wyrough, Mark Keib — are "all basically pretty much the same, pretty good fastballs, pretty good curveballs," says Miles. The other two hurlers are Bob Cooper and Todd Streeter.

CATCHER: Stepping into the all-star shoes of Chuck Costello is Kevin Lynch, who as a junior varsity player last season hit five home runs, the most ever hit by any Wellsville baseball player. "He's a very improved, tremendous worker," notes Miles. "He went to camp last year, which helped defensivly. We had an all-star catcher in Charlie, and I don't see a drop-off in this position."

FIRST BASE: Steady Ian Fanton will begin his third varsity season at this position. "Excellent all-around on offense and defense. He'll carry a lot of the load," says Miles. Fanton hit 256 last season, with a triple and seven runs batted in. Along with Bob Cooper and Doug Payne, Fanton is one of the team's captains.

SECOND BASE: Sophomore Dave Smith has been a surprise for Miles at this position. "He's quick, he hits the ball well, and I consider him probably the best all-around athlete out of the sophomore class," says Miles. "He bunts, he runs well — he's got excellent fundamentals for basebalh." Backing Smith up will be Doug Insley and Shane Bays.

SHORTSTOP: Pat Bush came up from the junior varsity during the middle of last year and performed well for the Lions, particularly on defense. But Bush tore his ankle, according to Miles, and isn't scheduled to come back until April 8 or 7. That would only be a few days before the April 11 opener at Portville.

Filling in has been Mark Keib, who hit .250 in four plate appearances last year. "He's not what you call a smooth shortstop, but he doesn get he job done," Miles says. He notes that he'll work Bush in slowly, "but a lot depends on how Mark does. He's wanted his chance to play, and now he's got it."

THIRD BASE: A transfer from Friendship last year, Bob Cooper steadily improved through the year, and his hitting skills will be at a premium on team whose hitting ability is uncertain.

Cooper had the fourth highest batting average in 1982, slugging .358 with four doubles and nine runs batted in. He had eight errors tagged to him, but most came early in the season.

"He's one of the best fielders I think I've ever coached," says Miles. "He's like a vacuum cleaner, very few balls get through. This year, he's looked awfully good at third base. Hittingwise, he's definitely a college prospect."

LEFT FIELD: The competition is wide-open, according to Miles. Jeff Swarthout is "probably the leading candidate," says Miles. "He's made out of the same moid as Smith, with 26 stolen bases with the jayvees, and he hit over .300." Other contenders are Kalamets, McNinch and Wyrough.

# Wellsville 'classy' in its season opening victory

Wellsville opened its 1983 baseball season with a bang. That bang was the sound of bat on ball as the Lions' offense shot Salamanca down in a 10-2 victory in Wellsville on Wednesday.

The game was switched from its originally scheduled Salamanca site to Wellsville because of field conditions and the change suited the Lions just fine.

Offense wasn't the only thing that Wellsville excelled at, however.

Dave Smith, the starting pitcher, and Mark Keib in relief, held Salamanca to just three hits for the game. Smith, the winning hurler, struck out five batters and walked only one while Keib fanned three batters in the two innings he worked, walking no one.

Bob Cooper on third made a couple of fine defensive plays that took Salamanca out of scoring innings. On one he dove to his right and snared the ball just as it crossed over the bag. He then scrambled to his feet and made an off balance throw to nail the runner at first.

Salamanca actually scored the first run of the game in the top of the first inning.

Jay Dry, with one out, singled then stole second. Steve Beattie walked putting runners on first and second before Smith struck out Terry Koniak. With two out, a passed ball allowed the runner on second to advance and he scored shortly after.

That run just seemed to be the

score Lynch before Wellsville had its second out.

With two down, Scott Phillips walked to put runners on the corners and Jeff Swarthout gave Wellsville a 5-1 lead with a run-scoring single.

Wellsville scored single runs in both the second and third innings as the game started to get out of reach.

In the second, Smith started with a long double to left-center field and he came home on Cooper's RBI single two outs later.

Phillips singled to start the third inning and went to second on a passed Wellsville runners on first and third. Cooper took an intentional walk and Keib grounded out to score Fanton.

"I was very pleased for the season opener," said Wellsville coach Denny Miles. "I thought that the defense was excellent, especially Cooper and (Shane) Bays (at shortstop). Cooper made two major league plays.

"The pitching looked good with Smith and Keib. Overall, I thought we looked very classy."

Wellsville pounded out 11 hits and committed just a single error in the game. Miles added, however, that it is just the start of the season.

"It's always nice to get that first win. We have to realize that it's just a start. There are a lot of ballgames ahead of us — there's a long way to go."

Cooper went three for three with three RBI's while Smith, and Fanton each had two hits in four trips to the plate.

Wellsville will take on Portville in Portville on Friday.

Wellsville came out of the weekend three wins ahead, taking a single game on Friday against Hornell and winning the Early Bird Tournament on Saturday.

In the championship game of the Saturday Tournament, Wellsville showed characteristic form by coming from behind to win it.

Caledonia-Mumford, who beat Honeoye-Falls-Lima in the second game by a 3-1 score, broke out to a 3-1 lead after the second inning but Wellsville showed no quit.

Wellsville went up 11-2 as it scored twice in the last of the sixth. Keib, with one out, doubled and a passed ball sent him to third. Lynch












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
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
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















## Wellsville's Gray wins National Bench Press championship for second straight year


"I was real happy," said Gray of winning his fourth title. "You kind of know what you can do and everyone else can do coming in, so it really wasn't a surprise.




